

- Co-operation with technical organizations







SPS Committee: Who is on it?

- All 159 WTO Members
- Observer governments (acceding members)
- Intergovernmental organizations

4 new WTO Members in 2012:

Montenegro (April), Russia (Aug.), Samoa (May) and Vanuatu (Aug.)

2 new WTO Members in 2013:

Lao PDR (Feb) and Tajikistan (March).

SPS: General Issues in implementation


- Lack of awareness
- Inappropriate legislation (or no existing legislation)
- Capacity limitations
- Failure to use international standards
- Undue delays in risk assessment, approval decisions, etc.
- Over-reactions in emergency situations
- Political pressures hazard-based measures







Specific Trade Concerns – SPS (1995-2012) 344 Total



1995-2012








Specific Trade Concerns by Subject

(1995-2012)





Remember: Conditions under which a SPS Measure can be taken:




- Restrain trade to protect health
- Measures <u>based on scientific principles</u> (international standards or risk assessment)
- Non-discriminatory
- No disguised restrictions



1. Bilateral and/or Regional Efforts

Suggested Actions:

- Contact Enquiry Point
- Informal discussions on the margins of the SPS Committee meetings
- Request information through diplomatic channels

2. SPS Committee - STCs

Suggested Actions:

- Consult previous Specific Trade Concerns (STCs)
- Communicate intention to raise an STC
 - —At least 11 calendar days before the meeting
 - —In writing
 - —Inform the other Member concerned
- Seek support from other interested Members
- Present the STC at the SPS Committee Meeting

3. Good Offices - Chair of the SPS Committee

Article 12.2

"The Committee shall encourage and facilitate ad hoc consultations or negotiations among Members on specific sanitary or phytosanitary issues. [...]"

Procedure currently under discussion in the SPS Committee (G/SPS/W/259/Rev.6)

4. WTO Dispute Settlement System

What is a WTO dispute?

- Arises when a Member believes another is violating an agreement or commitment made
- Only involves governments
- Not a WTO dispute until the Member country notifies WTO Secretariat that a dispute exists







4. WTO Dispute Settlement System - Main Stages

- I. Consultation phase
- II. Panel review
- III. [AB review]

Good offices, conciliation and mediation possible at any moment

- IV. Adoption of report(s) by the DSB
- V. Implementation





*Importantly for SPS Trade Problems:

Dispute Settlement of OIE and IPPC

IPPC

Technical dispute settlement body

OIE

Technical mediation

- > Pros:
- Technical evaluation only
- No involvement of lawyers
- Less costly
- > Cons:
- Enforcement difficulties
- Not binding

Good Offices by the Chair of the SPS Committee

Why is it being discussed?	 Useful route to facilitate agreement between Members on specific trade concerns.
Issue:	 No specific procedures for its use. Focus is on developing procedures.
Discussions in the Committee	• Several draft texts have been proposed based on Members' comments but with no agreement.
	• Members have discussed whether the procedure should:
	be mandatory or voluntary;
	be transparent or confidential;
	specify the role for the facilitator;
	have set timeframes for each stage; and
	❖ be linked to other ongoing initiatives.
	A final revision of the proposed procedure will be up for

adoption in the October 2013 meeting.

Private Standards in International Trade – Why & How?

- Food safety concerns (BSE, E-coli, Salmonella)
- Private companies liability for food safety risks
- "Corporate Social Responsibility" and "Reputation Risks"
- Consumer increasing expectations, better informed, more health conscious and organized
- Estimation of over 400 private schemes (UNCTAD)

Private Standards

Why is it being discussed?

- Market access implications (Private Standards going beyond official food safety requirements e.g., Maximum Residue Levels -MRLs)
- Developmental implications (Costs associated with private standards)
- Legal aspects (Applicability of SPS Agreement Art. 13)

Discussions in the Committee

- The Committee has agreed on 5 of 12 proposed actions. Discussions now around how to implement the agreed actions.
- Most discussions have centred around Action 1: "SPS Committee to develop a working definition of private SPS standards"
- Members continue to discuss proposals to define SPS-related private standards.





Actions on Private Standards adopted by the SPS Committee (G/SPS/55)

- Action 1: SPS Committee to develop a working definition of private SPS standards
- Action 2: SPS Committee should regularly inform the three sisters on relevant developments
- Action 3: the Secretariat to inform the Committee on developments in other WTO fora
- Action 4: Members are encouraged to communicate with private standard entities in their territories to sensitize them to the issues raised in the SPS Committee
- Action 5: SPS Committee, Codex, the OIE, and the IPPC to support the development and/or dissemination of informative materials
